# How technologies have changed

- Home computers were a class of microcomputers (almost all 8-bit) entering the market in **1977**, and becoming common during the **1980s**. They were marketed to consumers as affordable and accessible computers that, for the first time, were intended for the use of a single nontechnical user.
- Sales of home computers have dropped for the first time most people use much lighter more assessable technology and in particular the mobile phone and most recent the smart phone




*Cyber-crime* is a type of crime carried out by criminals using computers or similar devices with a connection to the internet.

*Cyber-dependent crimes* can only be committed using computers, computer networks or other forms of ICT. This includes the creation and spread of malware for financial gain, hacking to steal important personal or industry data and denial of service attacks.

*Cyber-enabled crimes* include fraud, the purchasing of illegal drugs and child exploitation and can be conducted on or offline



Almost everyone is using the internet these days. But there are dangers; the internet provides a way for people to participate in various dishonest behaviours including stealing identities, preying on vulnerable people, and cyberbullying. Parents, not only have to protect themselves from these risks, but must protect their children as well.
