Setting up the space


We decided to meet the new women in a community centre, for a cup of coffee and a warm welcome.

We work with Arabic and Pashto interpreters so we can equally understand each other and create a safe space for getting together as women.

Tow to make the Space feel welcoming Name tags Pinch pots - women lead


Welcoming questions Our name, what does it mean? Do you have any bobbies? What's your favourite colour - why what do you like to do in your space time
