

Climate craft activities for groups

RECYCLED PIGGY BANK

What You Need

Plastic bottle, scissors, knife, marker pen, pink craft paper, 4 bottle tops, glue, eyes, pink paint pen.







Step 2

To make the pink band around the body place the bottle on the paper and mark with a pen or pencil the width you want the body to be.

Step 3

Using a ruler draw a line from your mark to the other end of the paper so you know where to cut.



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Step 4

Using the scissors cut along the line.

Step 5

In the middle of your paper draw box long ways across your paper. This will be your money slot.

Step 6

Place your paper over your bottle with the money slot at the top. Using a pen draw around your hole onto the bottle.





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Step 7

Being very careful use the knife or scissors to cut out the coin hole in the bottle.



Glue the back of your paper and then stick it to the bottle making sure you line up the coin holes. You may need a bit of tape to secure it in place.

Step 9

Using the paint pen paint the bottle top to make the nose. Let the paint dry.

Step 10

On your leftover paper draw 2 ear shapes and a tail.

Step 11Using the scissors cut out your ears & tail.





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Step 12

With your scissors closed, hold the tail in one hand and the scissors in the other. Run the scissors down the tail to make it curl.

Step 13

Glue your tail & your ears onto the bottle and add your eyes.










Step 14

Using the sharpie add 2 dots to your painted lid to make the nostrils.





Glue 4 bottle tops to the bottom to make your feet.



RECYCLED BIRD FEEDER

What you will need:

- Clean plastic water or juice bottles
- Sticks, wooden spoons, or wooden chopsticks something for the birds to perch on
- Scissors or craft knife to cut the holes in the bottle
- String or wire to hang the feeder
- Bird seed



Step 1 - Pierce the perch holes

- At the bottom of the bottle use your scissors or craft knife to push a hole on each side of the bottle.
- The holes should be opposite each other.
- Try to make them the same size at your sticks so they don't fall out.
- If you're using a wooden spoon, make one hole bigger this will allow some seed to roll into the spoon.
- When you have made the two holes, push your sticks or wooden spoons through the holes.

Step 2 - Pierce the feeding holes

- Using your scissors or craft knife cut a small hole where the bird can pick out the seeds.
- Cut the hole above the perch the size and height of the hole can be different depending on what birds you are feeding.
- Try to ensure there are no sharp or jagged edges around the edge.





Step 3 - Add the string

- The string or wire will be used to hang up your feeder.
- Cut a piece of string about 30cm long and tie it around the top of your bottle feeder.
- It might help to have one person holding the bottle and one person doing the string.

Step 4 - Fill your bottle with seeds

- It's now time to fill your bottle with seeds. If you're doing this
 indoors place a tray or plate under the bottles before you fill them
 this will catch any seeds that fall out.
- It can be tricky to get the seed into the bottle without spilling it. A scoop, cup or jug can make it easier. You can make a funnel by rolling up a scrap piece of paper this makes it easy to fill!
- Make sure you fill your bottle until it comes above the feeding hole.








Step 5 - It's ready to hang!

- Put the lid back on your feeder.
- Where are you going to hang it? Birds like to feel safe when they're feeding so look for spaces where the feeder is sheltered.
- Keep an eye out for birds using the feeder and keep it topped up with seeds throughout the winter months.
- You might need to try it in different spaces to find a spot that works for the birds in your area.
- If you notice that the seeds have gone soft or mouldy empty them out and give your feeder a clean before refilling.
